Our students found the experience both moving and memorable – a chance to honour those who fought for freedom and to carry the message of remembrance into the future.



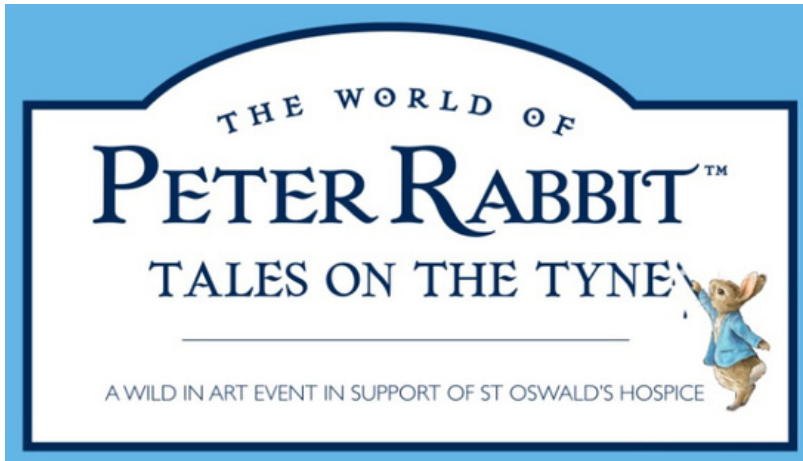
Hello from Mr Charlton, Head of Year 10
